How to talk about work?

Plenary Session: Difference of perspectives and possibilities of alliances between journalism and sociology of work

12:00-14:00 CET TIME ZONE



In the last few years, several important and well-received non-fiction books about work and labour we published in Poland, including Olga Gitkiewicz' *Nie hańbi* (2017) and Marek Szymaniak's *Urobieni* (2018). Working conditions in Poland become an important topic of journalists' interventions and are slowly taking their rightful place in the center of public debate. They also turn out to be a risky and dangerous topic, as evidenced by the experience of journalists who face global companies that guard their economic interests.

How the discourse about work has changed in recent years in Poland? What are the pressures and expectations voiced by publishers, audiences and other actors, such as trade unions, regarding writing about work? How to report on trade union activities? Finally: what is place of sociology of work and other related disciplines in this discussion? How to shape cooperation between journalists, sociologists and trade unions? Which other actors should be involved in the media discussion about work?

We will discuss those questions during the debate with journalists and reporters: Katarzyna Duda, Olga Gitkiewicz, Kacper Leśniewicz, Adriana Rozwadowska, Marek Szymaniak. Debate will be moderated by sociologist Julia Kubisa.

- Katarzyna Duda, law and political science graduate. Author of two reports on employment conditions in outsourcing security and cleaning companies providing services to public institutions. Author of the book on Polish transformation *Kiedyś tu było życie teraz jest tylko bieda. O ofiarach polskiej transformacji.* A specialist in social policy in the OPZZ (The All-Poland Alliance of Trade Unions) Department of Social Policy, Labor Market, Insurance and Health.
- Olga Gitkiewicz, reporter and editor, author of two non-fiction books: Nie hańbi and Nie zdążę. Columnist of the "Znak" monthly, collaborates with the Instytut Reportażu.
- Kacper Leśniewicz journalist, od kilku lat współpracuje z Dziennikiem Gazetą Prawną, he has published in Przekrój, Tygodniku Przegląd, Nowy Obywatel, Nowe Peryferie. In 2019 he was nominated to the Grand Press in the "Journalism" category.
- Adriana Rozwadowska journalist and columnist of Gazeta Wyborcza economic section. Reports on job market, social issues and trade unions from workers' perspective. Co-host of "Kowalski & Schmidt" socio-cultural magazine broadcasted by German TV channel RBB.
- Marek Szymaniak journalist and reporter specializing in the job market. Author of non-fiction book "Urobieni. Reportaże o pracy".
- Chair: dr hab. Julia Kubisa, sociologist, Faculty of Sociology, University of Warsaw. Her research interests include gendered division of labour and workplace quality. She is the Chair of the Sociology of Work Section of Polish Sociological Association.
